The services of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter unfold in a single movement (in three acts) as the church each year makes the passage with Christ through death into life. **The Paschal Triduum is the heart of the Christian life,** so allow your lives this week to be conformed to the worship rhythms of the church rather than the chaos of the schedules laid upon us by the world surrounding us. **The word "holy" means to be "set apart" from the rest for a purpose**. These days are to be set apart

from all others, so I urge you to cancel meetings and appointments, finish all shopping and chores before Thursday evening, and reduce the use of electronics and transportation. Do whatever you need to do (or not to do) in order to honor and observe Holy Week and the days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday during which there should be little or no activity or work. Instead, there needs to be prayer, meditation, quiet, and praise as we gather with Christians around the world to worship, to remember, and to celebrate our freedom from the enslavements to death.
