

Ash Wednesday and the Forty Days of Lent

The holy season of Lent begins Ash Wednesday, February 18th. The service time is 7:15 p.m. Christians gather on this holy day to make the beginning of Lent's baptismal preparation for Easter. On this day, we receive an ashen cross on the forehead—a gesture rooted in baptism—make extended confession, hear the solemn proclamation to keep a fast in preparation for Easter's feast, and contemplate anew the ongoing meaning of our baptism into the Lord's death and resurrection. While marked with the ashes of human mortality, the church hears God's promise of forgiveness and tastes God's mercy in the bread of life and the cup of salvation. Please mark this holy day on your calendars.



A HISTORY OF SAINT VALENTINE'S DAY

Valentine's Day started in the time of the Roman Empire. In ancient Rome, February 14th was a holiday to honor Juno who was the Queen of the Roman gods and goddesses. The Romans also knew her as the goddess of women and marriage. The following day, February 15th, began the Feast of Lupercalia.

The lives of young boys and girls were strictly separate, however, one of the customs of the young people was name drawing. On the eve of the festival of Lupercalia the names of Roman girls were written on slips of paper and placed into jars. Each young man would draw a girl's name from the jar and would then be partners for the duration of the festival with the girl whom he chose. Sometimes the pairing of the children lasted an entire year, and often they would fall in love and would later marry.

Under the rule of Emperor Claudius II, Rome was involved in many bloody and unpopular campaigns. Claudius the Cruel was having a difficult time getting soldiers to join his military leagues. He believed that the reason was that Roman men did not want to leave their loves or families. As a result, Claudius canceled all marriages and engagements in Rome. The good Saint Valentine was a priest at Rome in the days of Claudius II. He and Saint Marius aided the Christian martyrs and secretly married couples, and for this kind deed Saint Valentine was apprehended and dragged before the Prefect of Rome who condemned him to be beaten to death with clubs and to have his head cut off. He suffered martyrdom on the 14th day of February, about the year A.D. 270.

At that time it was the custom in Rome, a very ancient custom indeed, to celebrate in the month of February the Lupercalia, feasts in honor of a heathen god. On these occasions, amidst a variety of pagan ceremonies, the names of young women were placed in a box, from which they were drawn by the men as chance directed.

The pastors of the early Christian Church in Rome endeavored to do away with the pagan element in these feasts by substituting the names of saints for those of maidens. And as the Lupercalia began about the middle of February, the pastors appear to have chosen Saint Valentine's Day for the celebration of this new feast. So it seems that the custom of young men choosing maidens for valentines, or saints as patrons for the coming year, arose in this way.

When Is Presidents' Day?

Presidents' Day is observed annual on the third Monday in February. In 2026, Presidents' Day will be celebrated on Monday, February 16th.

Presidents' Day History

Historically, Americans began celebrating George Washington's Birthday just months after his death, long before Congress declared it a federal holiday. It was not until 1879, under President Rutherford B. Hayes, that Washington's Birthday became a legal holiday, to be observed on his birthday, February 22.

Washington's birthday was celebrated on February 22 until well into the 20th century. In 1968, Congress passed the Monday Holiday Law to "provide uniform annual observances of certain legal public holidays on Monday." By creating more 3-day weekends, Congress hoped to "bring substantial benefits to both the spiritual and economic life of the Nation."

Today, Washington's Birthday is one of only 11 permanent holidays established by Congress observed each year. One of the great traditions followed for decades has been the reading of the Washington's Farewell Address—which remains an annual event for the Senate to this day.

When Is George Washington's Real Birthday?

Although the federal holiday is held on a Monday (the third Monday of February), Washington's birthday is observed on February 22. To complicate matters, Washington was actually born on February 11 in 1731! How can that be?

Washington was originally born when the Julian calendar was in use. During Washington's lifetime, people in Great Britain and America switched the official calendar system from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar (something that most of Europe had already done in 1582).

As a result of this calendar reform, people born before 1752 were told to add 11 days to their birth dates. Those born between January 1 and March 25, as Washington was, also had to add one year to be in sync with the new calendar.

By the time Washington became president in 1789, he celebrated his birth on February 22 and listed his year of birth as 1732.

To summarize, Washington's birthday changed from February 11, 1731 (Old-Style Julian calendar), to February 22, 1732 (New-Style Gregorian calendar).

Myths About Washington

Legend has it, Washington chopped down a cherry tree when he was 6 years old and, when confronted by his father, said, "I cannot tell a lie. I did it with my hatchet."

Well, we can not tell a lie, either. Washington didn't say this; he didn't even chop down the tree! This tale was in fact concocted by Parson Mason Weems (1759-1825), one of Washington's biographers, who made up the story hoping to demonstrate Washington's honesty.

This tale is not the only myth about Washington. His wooden dentures? They weren't made of wood; they were made of hippopotamus teeth that had been filed down to fit into Washington's mouth.

Upon entering office, Washington was not convinced that he was the right man for the job. He wrote, "My movements to the chair of government will be accompanied by feelings not unlike those of a culprit who is going to the place of his execution." Fortunately for the young country, he was wrong.

Cherry Cream Pie

Easy to make and wonderfully versatile. Try it with any type of fruit pie filling or with fresh or frozen fruit—strawberries or raspberries, for instance—over the cream cheese base.

Ingredients:

8 oz. (1 pkg) cream cheese, at room temperature
½ c. confectioners' sugar, sifted
½ tsp. almond extract
½ pint whipping cream
1 8 or 9 inch graham cracker pie crust
1 can (16 oz) cherry pie filling

Instructions:

Blend the cream cheese, confectioners' sugar, and almond extract until smooth. Whip the cream until stiff. Fold the whipped cream into the cream cheese mixture. Pour into the pie crust. Top with the pie filling. Chill for a least 1 hour before serving.

Makes 6 to 8 servings.
