Hello Pastor,

I was so happy to hear from you via Michelle, and now I'm happy to fill you in! We've been working steadily on forming the band and trying to figure out how to play these instruments. There have been many baby steps adding up to current day progress.

The first step was to restore the instruments. I did minimal alterations: I touched up paint and glitter, coated instruments with water-based polyurethane. For the saxophone, I made three new buttons to replace the missing ones, and on the pie tin instrument my father welded a loop on the back for attaching a strap. We also built two replicas: one based on the juice can instrument and the other a washtub. The originals were too delicate and we wanted to preserve them as they were. We also gave each instrument a name.







Things really seem to be taking off recently. There is so much to do I can hardly keep up! Plus, practicing the music! And we just bought our first PA system so now we are learning about performing and getting a good sound. We've got the stringed instruments amplified with contact mics.







So far I have two faithful bandmates who are on this journey with me and eventually we might add a fourth if we can find the right match. This year we had our first two official performances. In October we performed in conjunction with a storytelling event that occurs once a month. This month we participated in a holiday block party and had a cozy spot in an upscale furniture store downtown, so it was a more casual event. This coming Monday one of the local news channels is coming over to do an interview and have us play for them. So I'm getting ready for that now.







Our next event will be May 1st, 2025. We will be putting on a two hour presentation for the Osher Learning Institute through Boise State University which hosts classes for adult learners over age 50. Our presentation will be interspersed with live music. I'll attach the write-up here to give you an idea. It would be great to get out to Chicago for a visit so I could do some research for the presentation but I'm not sure if I'll be able to afford it. Please spread the word about this presentation to the families. I would love it if you and any family members could contribute memories and share whatever they know about the original band and how it came about.










