Jazz Vocalist Terry Sullivan

On Sunday, February 2nd at 4 p.m., I will perform a concert with the superb young guitarist Gabriel Datcu who is a native of Transylvania, Romania and one of the most gifted musicians I have met. Music simply pours out of him. To top it off, we will be joined by bassist Clark Sommers who is, in jazz parlance, a "monster" (meaning he plays very well). Clark has literally toured the world with jazz vocalist Kurt Elling; but for one Sunday afternoon he is ours.




Jazz Guitarist Gabriel Datcu

Jazz guitarist Gabriel Datcu is a native of Transylvania, Romania. He began his musical journey at age four and by age nine was playing piano and acoustic guitar. As a teen, he was given several cassette tapes, one was Christopher Parkening playing Bach and another was a recording of jazz guitarists Joe Pass and Barney Kessel with Ella Fitzgerald. Since then, Gabriel's commitment to studying these two music styles—classical and improvisatory—has been uncompromising. While a student at both the National University of Music and the National University of Arts in Bucharest, Gabriel was invited to perform at several local music venues. Doing so allowed him to meet, study and perform with several of the best Romanian jazz musicians, including Sorin Romanescu, Tudy Zaharescu and Pedro Negrescu. At age eighteen he was asked to record at the National Radio-Television studios, and at nineteen, to embark on a two-week tour across Switzerland. In 2000, Gabriel was offered the chance to study and settle in the United States.—TS

We were willing to put all our energy into finding a better life, no matter what it would require. That is the kind of inner readiness that finally made real change possible.

Such willingness to take an uncompromising stand and give ourselves totally to a worthwhile cause is a model for our lives. It's the beginning of deep change. Many men and women have taken similar heroic stands for other causes, like world peace, compassion for the poor and hungry, human rights, and protection of the environment.

On this day, I will take a stand for what is worthwhile.
