A NATIONAL DAY OF THANKSGIVING

In the first year of the presidency of George Washington in 1789, a Day of National Thanksgiving was set aside for the last Thursday of November. Since that time, Americans have celebrated this day in remembrance of all the blessings which God has poured down upon the nation.

In the presidential proclamation for Thanksgiving Day in 1863, President Abraham Lincoln had this to say:

"It is the duty of nations as well as of citizens to owe their dependence upon the overruling power of God; to confess their sins and transgressions in humble sorrow, yet with assured hope that genuine repentance will lead to mercy and pardon; and to recognize the sublime truth, announced in the Holy Scriptures and proven by all history, that those nations are blessed whose God is the Lord... .

..."We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of heaven; we have been preserved these many years in peace and prosperity; we have grown in numbers, wealth and power as no other nation has ever grown. But we have forgotten God. We have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us, and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with unbroken success we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us.

"It has seemed to me fit and proper that God should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully acknowledged, as with one heart and one voice, by the whole American people. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November as a day of Thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens."

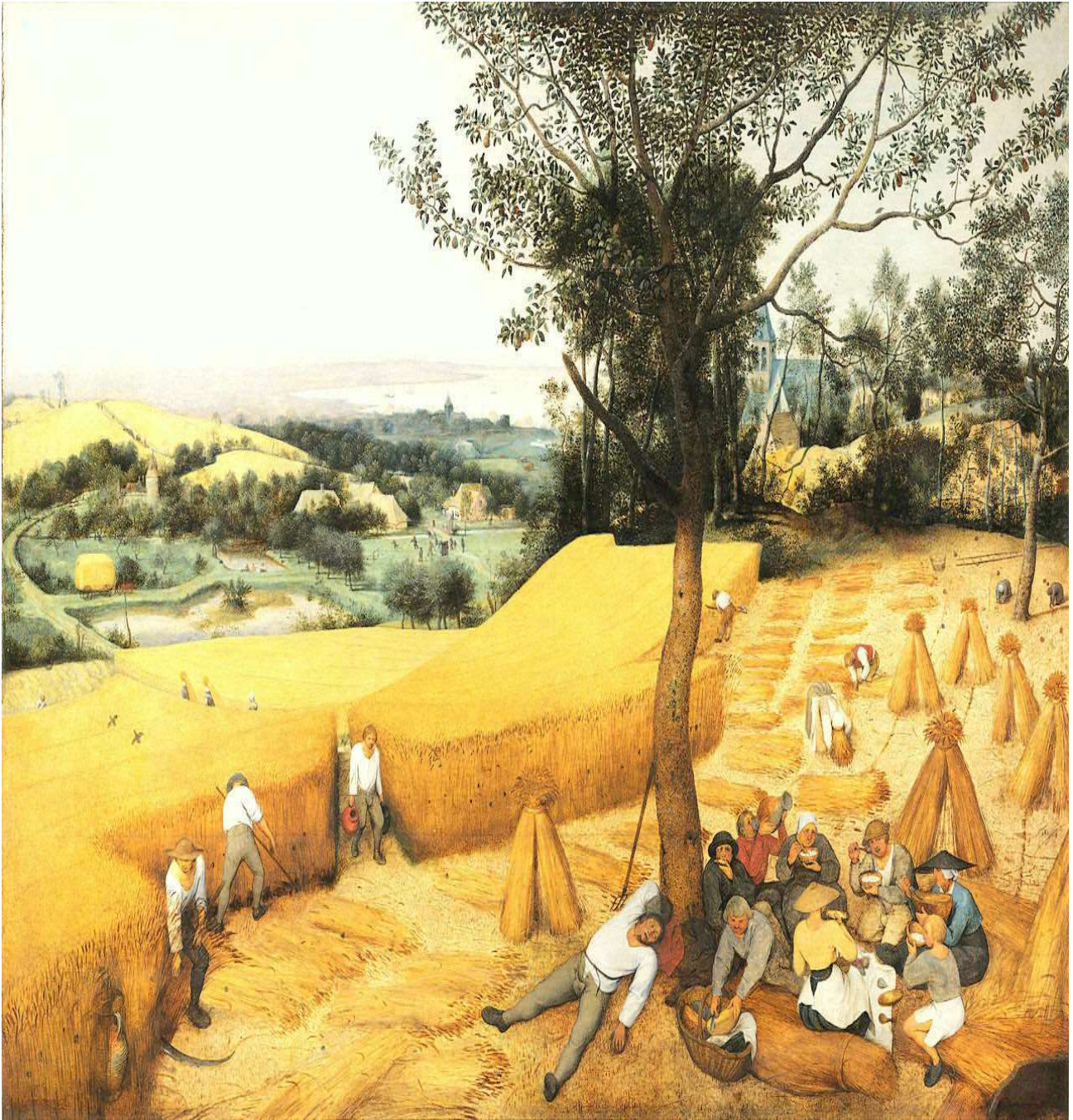

Day of Thanksgiving

For thousands of years, human communities have kept harvest festivals. Indeed, several of the annual celebrations described in the Old Testament were previously harvest festivals onto which the Israelites layered their tribe's historical memories. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln called for a national day of Thanksgiving, in hopes that such a festival might bring some unity to the North and the South. This holiday became attached to the memory of an autumn harvest festival held in 1621 in Plymouth colony, Massachusetts. Of the 102 passengers on the Mayflower in 1620, only 53 were alive a year later, but 90 Wampanoag came for the three-day celebration, bringing with them much of the food. In 1941, President Franklin Roosevelt declared the fourth Thursday in November to be a national Thanksgiving holiday. Canadians keep Thanksgiving on the second Monday in October. In the United States, Thanksgiving is a holiday of immense popularity for family feasts and national sports activities. Immigrant communities have added to the traditional foods their own ethnic harvest foods.

Some Christians add to the event a worship service, usually held on Thanksgiving Eve [or Morning]. For such a service, the interpretation of the biblical readings has been simplified in order to focus on the single theme of "thanksgiving."
